



## Message from the Principal

Welcome to our spring newsletter. You will see from the wide range of articles that we have had a very busy and productive few months.

The highly encouraging Ofsted report, which judged the school as **Good** following the visit in February, was a testament to the hard work and commitment from students and staff. As a school, we are always striving to outperform our previous best and it is gratifying that the inspectors mentioned this in their report. The inspectors praised the 'culture of high aspirations and ambition'.

As we approach 'The Final Countdown' for Years 11, 12 and 13 exams, it was really encouraging to see so many students attending the intervention sessions over the Easter break. We were pleased to welcome parents and students to the Year 11 Information and Revision evening, providing additional support and resources.

Over the Easter break, major work started on the state of the art extension for the new Sixth Form Centre which opens in September 2016. This will provide a dedicated Sixth Form only learning environment incorporating large lecture theatres, additional classrooms, an ICT/media suite and a larger common room.

The focus on high standards continues and we have seen awards presented across year groups for students using excellent DIRT (Dedicated Improvement and Reflection Time) and outstanding presentation in their work.

Our students enjoyed a range of successes last term. The United Learning Best in Everyone Awards have just been announced and I am very pleased to say that two of our students have received awards for their exceptional performance and effort and will receive these awards from Jon Coles, Group Chief Executive at the ceremony in July. Our Year 9 team, who entered the United Learning Billion Ideas App competition, finished in second place and were a credit to the school.

Careers and Enterprise have been very active, ending last term with the 'Maximise Your Potential Day', providing all Year 10 students and the Sixth Form the opportunity to talk directly to over 45 businesses, equipping them with a greater understanding of the skills and qualities employers are looking for in today's competitive marketplace. Students will get the opportunity to test their skills in June when Year 12 embark on work experience.

The focus now is on the forthcoming exams and I wish our students all the very best.

## 7 billion IDEAS

### 7 Billion Ideas—#unitedlearningapp2016

United Learning have partnered with 7billionideas to promote entrepreneurial spirit, innovation and team work across United Learning schools, and introduce participating pupils to the world of coding with their app competition.

The competition, for Year 9 pupils involved 7billionideas' founders travelling around the country visiting 35 secondary schools in 20 days, running interactive assemblies to inspire pupils to have confidence in their own ideas. Their task was to come up with an idea for an educational app.

Northampton Academy had 47 teams enter the competition and we are pleased to report that three teams made it through to the second round (out of 5,000 plus students!) **Team idraw, Team Leaders and Team Educate** produced a 60 second video/advert. **Team Educate** made it through to the final at IBM in February. Team Educate's app was a fantastic idea to help students find work experience. They gave an outstanding performance and finished in second place (out of 444 teams who entered). **Congratulations to Year 9s Tadi, Dexter and Emma.**



Dexter said: "The competition really showed me that in order to get what you want, you need to work hard. It's also really important to listen to others and connect with them to help make your idea stronger. An idea can help to inspire and educate people but you need to make sure you are passionate and that you make other people believe in your idea as much as you do."


## THE OPERA COMES TO NORTHAMPTON ACADEMY



## Show My Homework

All parents should now have the login details for 'Show My Homework' (SMH). If you have any queries, please contact the Academy.

Using SMH, all teachers create and publish their homework online. Parents and students can log into their own personalised accounts and see only the homework relevant to them. You can review submission times, see grades and communicate with teachers.

As a parent, gone are the days of lost worksheets, illegible and missing instructions:

- ✓ All homework details are accessible 24/7 and can be read via the free iOS & Android app
- ✓ Monitor from a distance: Stay in the loop without being intrusive
- ✓ Enjoy peace of mind and never have to deal with late-night homework battles again!



With the success of Show My Homework, from September 2016 school planners will no longer be issued to students. If students would still like a diary/planner, they can purchase a copy from the school for 50p.


## Year 12 Reader Leaders



## Library News

Staff will often have extra revision sessions with students, meetings etc. after school and therefore may not be able to meet with you without prior arrangement.

### REMINDER: Mobile Phones and Electronic Equipment

A reminder of the mobile phone policy that has been communicated to parents/carers by text and email at the start of the term is as follows:

Mobile phones are not permitted in classes, assemblies, tutor time and in A-E block. If a student is found using a mobile phone, they will be asked to put their phone away in the first instance. If a student refuses, then it will be confiscated. The phone will be returned at the end of the day or the parent/carer will be asked to collect it.
