As part of its strategy, the school has introduced a variety of new enrichment opportunities to help improve staff physical wellbeing, including access to fitness classes, art classes and choir. The school has also adopted a flexible working approach for staff and circulates a weekly bulletin, signposting resources and useful apps to encourage positive mental health.

Alongside ensuring the wellbeing of its teachers and support staff, the Academy is committed to developing its young people into confident, well-rounded and ambitious individuals by delivering an Education with Character. This means giving students the opportunity to develop new skills, face challenges head-on and succeed through persistence and determination.

Testament to the success of the school's approach is this year's destinations for Years 11 and 13. 100% of the Academy's students who applied to university gained a place, with 42% going on to Russell Group institutions and six students accepting places to study medicine. Education With Character

Black History Month



This year, we took our first step in striving toward a more eloquent, inclusive, and open national narrative, starting with Black History

While Black History Month maintains the essential job of highlighting the contributions and experiences of African and Caribbean heritage people in this country, it should not be a substitute for striving toward a more eloquent, inclusive, and open national narrative.

We are part of increasingly interconnected communities. The intersectionality of these communities means that it is becoming more obviously flawed to draw boundaries around groups contributions, experiences, and actions. Our choices - and

the relics of those choices don't seem to follow the boundaries of calendars or single categories of identity. Through decades of campaigns, struggles, and growth in the UK, we are making good strides in acknowledging and writing a more inclusive narrative of our history. This has been done in part by unearthing, augmenting, and reconstructing derelict voices and experiences. We've also diversified the voices that write and teach these histories.

This year, in a deliberate act, we decided to elevate the narrative to move past the reliance on one month as a 'catch-all' to represent the experiences, contributions, and voices of African and Caribbean heritage.

We did this by building on the work of activists, teachers, historians, and everyday people. We ask why we tell the stories we tell and what impact these stories have on young people? For example, as part of our Character Development Programme, starting in September and leading up to Black History Month - students explored topics of identity (Year 7), our obligation to others (Year 8), standing up for justice (Year 9) and human rights (Year 10).

We ask who or what is missing when we think our stories are complete? We asked questions about our own identities and biases in the histories we create and share. Finally, we asked: Why do we gravitate to stories of specific individuals, groups, and events? And, who might be left out of those preferences?

This year we amplified the stories of local people. Students listened to the Michael Phillips Chief Crown Prosecutor tell his story, and Sixth Form students heard from a former student, Tremaine Richard-Noel, Head of Emerging Technology and Automotive Acceleration Programme Director, who recounted his journey.



We elevated the narrative by asking students to advocate for more voices from diverse backgrounds while deconstructing the 'norm' against which we measure such diversity. For example, in our DEAR Programme (Drop Everything And Read), students read about inspirational, powerful, and positive young black role models. In addition, during October, we celebrated black music and culture in our 'Lunchtime Extravaganzas'. For example, students sang and danced to music from Afro-beats, Reggae, American R&B and Hip-Hop. In addition, students read poems by Maya Angelo and Amanda Gorman.

Finally, we encouraged students to capture the moment in Art. We had a competition with the title 'Our Differences Unite Us' and below are the winning and second place entries.



First place is a soundtrack created by Ethan C in Year 7, scan the QR code to listen.

Joint second place was this abstract piece by Esther T (top of page) and a poem by Makeda S, both in Year 10 (left).

Moustaches In Vogue for Movember!

A group of teachers at Northampton Academy, including principal, Mr Clyne ditched their razors in November in support of men's charity 'Movember'. They have raised over £1100 to make a difference in mental health and suicide prevention, prostate cancer and testicular cancer.

Movember is a leading charity focusing on mens' health, focusing on the following:

Mental Health and Suicide Prevention

The rate of male suicide is alarmingly high: 3 out of 4 suicides in the UK are by men. Movember looks at mental health through a male lens, focusing on prevention, early intervention and health promotion. By 2030, Movember is looking to reduce the suicide rate in men by 25%.

Prostate Cancer

Prostate cancer is the most commonly diagnosed cancer in men in the UK. Globally, more than 1.4 million men are diagnosed with prostate cancer each year. Across the country, there are more than



395,000 men living with and beyond the disease. Many are dealing with serious side effects from treatment. The charity has spent years immersed in prostate cancer research, pushing progress forward 50 years, by thinking differently, collaborating globally and investing guickly in what works. Movember aims to halve the number of men dying from prostate cancer and halve the number of men facing serious ongoing side effects from treatment by 2030.

Testicular Cancer

Testicular cancer strikes young and is the most common cancer in young men. At greater than 95%, the odds of survival for men with testicular cancer are better than good – but for some men, long-term treatment-related side effects, mean their quality of life is severely compromised. The Movember charity focuses on getting these predominantly young men back to living full and healthy lives. By 2030, Movember aims to halve the number of men dying from testicular cancer, and halve the number of men facing serious ongoing side effects from treatment.

It was a wonderful evening dedicated to recognising the incredible efforts of our students when they showcase our values of respect, determination, ambition, tolerance, and integrity. Furthermore, recognising the development of students' character both inside and outside the classroom.

It was also a pleasure to welcome local professional Saints rugby players Lewis Ludlam and James Grayson, two people who embody our core values. Lewis and James entertained students, parents/carers and staff with an inspirational speech of how they have had to develop their character to achieve their goals in rugby and how proud our students should be to have been selected for such awards.

We hope everyone enjoyed the evening as much as we did. Parents and carers should be incredibly proud of the winners for their achievement of being recognised in this way and we look forward to the next awards evening next summer.

Some of the research topics involved included climate change, the legal and justice system, K-Pop, refugees, and the industrial revolution, to name just a few. Students spoke about how this process had built their character and enhanced their resilience after finding the process challenging, yet they were determined to finish.

All were very proud of themselves, as were Mrs Rigby, Miss Tustin and Mr Cook who organised the project.

ARTiculation

ARTiculation is the Roche Court Educational Trust's nationally acclaimed public speaking initiative designed to promote the appreciation and discussion of visual culture.

ARTiculation engages young people aged between 16 and 19, regardless of background or experience, with art and develops their confidence and ability to express their opinions, thoughts and conclusions.

Discovery Days

Discovery Days are part of an outreach programme taking place in museums and galleries across the country. Designed to develop young people's ability to look, think and speak about art through research and questioning. They are fully funded through grants and donations and are open to schools from the state sector.

Northampton Academy Year 12 students collaborated with other Sixth Formers from Walton High in Milton Keynes to plan and deliver a presentation on critical and contextual art analysis.

This provided our students with a leadership opportunity, team building experience and honing their writing skills in preparation for writing their 3000-word essay 'The Personal Study'. A mandatory assessment unit at A Level.

Students each delivered a tenminute presentation about a work of art, architecture or an artefact of their choice. Adjudicators then assessed each presentation as a whole, looking at content, structure, delivery and the speaker's original approach and unique potential.


Minecraft Education

Mandy offered a great insight into the opportunities provided by this government department, detailing opportunities in career development and travel. We look forward to working with Mandy again in the future.






