

Northampton Academy to become Regional Character Hub

School will support other schools on their character education journey

Northampton Academy is to join a new initiative created by the Jubilee Centre of Character and Virtues. The Regional Character Hubs is a nationwide programme that will see clusters of exceptional Schools of Character play an active role in supporting other schools on their character journey.

The exceptional standard of character education displayed within Northampton Academy is recognised as having the potential to inspire and transform other schools. The Regional Character Hubs model will provide a framework for schools to access valuable insights and learnings from selected Character Kitemark schools.

The Regional Character Hubs initiative will enable regions across the UK to have clusters of outstanding Schools of Character committed to supporting other local schools to embed character education that is taught, caught, and sought. This principle is at the heart of the Regional Character Hubs model. Experience has shown that when schools are inspired and learn directly from other schools, it can bring about significant change.

In addition to this, the school will become a member of the National Group of Excellence in Character Education. This group will meet bi-annually to set the direction for the following six months and share their expertise.

The school will be attending a launch event hosted by the Jubilee Centre for Character and Virtues at The University of Birmingham on the 9th of March. The full-day event will involve training led by experts from the Jubilee Centre and a co-design workshop to shape how the initiative will be implemented.

Northampton Academy was accredited with the Kitemark Plus award in October 2021, having demonstrated that putting character and values front and centre of their educational experience is transformative. Students' actions and behaviours are guided by virtue, helping them make the right choices at the right time, enabling themselves and the wider society to flourish. The embedded Character Curriculum provides the bedrock for an increase in attainment, improved behaviour and attendance, reduced exclusions, and staff retention and levels of well-being rising.

Chris Clyne, the school Principal, said:

"We are proud to have been chosen to be part of this initiative and recognised as a National School of Excellence for Character Education. We look forward to working with many schools and supporting them as they look to develop their character programmes. This opportunity aligns with our vision of being recognised nationally and internationally as a school."

How will the regional character hubs work?

Schools that have demonstrated an exceptional standard of character education through the Kitemark process are invited to be a part of the small cluster of schools that make up their Regional Character Hub. These will be schools that have either been awarded the Kitemark Plus or found to be close to the Kitemark Plus standard.

Individual schools and their Regional Character Hubs will be responsible for implementing their strategy to support local schools on their character journey.

Will the regional character hubs ever come together?

Yes. Twice a year, all schools within the UK Regional Character Hubs initiative will join a National Group of Excellence to share best practices and receive leadership training. The first of these meetings will be on the 9th of March 2022, when the initiative is launched.

How will the regional character hubs and their offer be promoted to schools?

A dedicated Regional Character Hubs page will be developed for the ACE website. This will have an interactive UK regional map to direct viewers to the Kitemark Schools that make up their Regional Character Hub. A critical success factor will be how the participating Kitemark Schools also use their existing networks and contacts to promote the support they offer.

Allen Ford Roadshow Visits NA

HPQ Study Skills Day

Some Year 9 students have participated in the Level-2 Higher Projection Qualification and visited the University of Reading for a study skills day. They heard from current academics and students and had a university tour. Completing the HPQ involves students working independently to pick a topic, thoroughly research the task, and then present their work through a c.2000-word essay and presentation. This is worth a GCSE. Students are supported by their supervisor, who adopts the coaching role. Mrs Tustin-Reeves has been very

impressed with the attitude and dedication the students have shown throughout the project and looks forward to seeing their final essays.



Oxford Next Generation Programme

Some of our year 10 students have been accepted onto the 'Oxford Next Generation Programme', run by the University of Oxford. This programme is a collaborative outreach project being piloted by the Oxford for East Midlands partners. It works directly with accepted schools to offer high-ability Year 10 students the chance to engage with and learn about Oxford University, providing support for students right through to the point of University applications in Year 13. 'Oxford NextGen' began with a launch event this term, introducing the students to the programme and the University of Oxford. The programme will follow students through high school and sixth form involving visits to Oxford, advice regarding A-Level and degree choices, and opportunities to develop super-curricular skills. Mrs Tustin-Reeves stated that: "We are very enthusiastic to be part of this programme and for the exciting opportunity this brings to our students."

Northampton Academy Wins National Teaching Award

Students and staff at Northampton Academy celebrate after the Academy was announced as one of the country's 80 Pearson National Teaching Award Silver Award winners.

The Pearson National Teaching Awards is an annual celebration of excellence in education. It was founded in 1998 by Lord Puttnam to recognise the life-changing impact inspirational staff can have on the lives of the young people they work with.



The school has been honoured with a Silver Award in The Award for Making a Difference — Secondary School of the Year, in celebration of the exceptional commitment it shows to enriching the lives of its young people and developing good character. Accredited with the prestigious Kitemark Plus Award for character education, the Academy also supports other schools across the country in strengthening their provision.

As a Silver Award winner, the Academy is being honoured as part of wider celebrations for national 'Thank a Teacher Day, which brings together people across the country to celebrate the schools and colleges at the heart of our communities. The Academy is also shortlisted to win one of just 16 Gold Awards later in the year.

Holocaust Memorial Day

This year the Academy marked Holocaust Memorial Day

Our theme was "One Day When We Realise That Our Differences Unite Us". At lunchtime on Thursday, 27th January, we held a Gallery Walk and Memorial Flames Campaign in the courtyard.

We believe that this process of reckoning or coming to terms with the history of the Holocaust and other genocides is one that continues today among historians, survivors and their descendants, politicians, citizens, and students.

As American author James Baldwin has said:

"History, as nearly no one seems to know, is not merely something to be read. And it does not refer merely, or even principally, to the past. On the contrary, the great force of history comes from the fact that we carry it within us, are unconsciously controlled by it in many ways, and history is literally present in all that we do."

Baldwin suggests that we won't understand history or ourselves unless we consider how the past is 'present' in our world. And the Holocaust - which historians describe as not merely a significant moment in history but a 'collapse in human civilisation' and a 'symbol of evil' - exerts a potent force.

Author Eva Hoffman, the daughter of Holocaust survivors, has observed:

"Sixty years after the Holocaust took place, our reckoning with this defining event is far from over. Indeed, as this immense catastrophe recedes from us in time, our preoccupation with it seems only to increase."

Taking Pride In Our LGBTQIA+ Community

June is celebrated internationally as Pride Month, and here at Northampton Academy, we joined in the celebrations of our LGBTQIA+ community.

Purpose and Importance

Pride Month commemorates the 1969 Stonewall Riots, also known as Stonewall Uprising, a momentous event in LGBTQIA+ history. It's one of the first accounts of a significant movement that strives to accept the LGBTQIA+ community into society. People around the globe celebrate and commemorate the achievements of LGBTQIA+ people.

This year is particularly special, as it marks the 50-year milestone of Pride in the UK. In 1972, over 2000 people gathered at Trafalgar Square in London for the first-ever Pride march in the UK. Presently, more than 1 million people celebrate Pride in London alone. And events now take place worldwide in celebration of the LGBTQ+ community.

Our students, supported by staff, have worked tirelessly to put together one of the biggest celebrations of Pride our school has ever seen. As a result, students could peruse our 'Happy Pride' display, featuring colourful, educational, and motivational posters as they entered the school.

Northampton Academy's Pride March 2022

The big event of the month was the Pride March that happened during lunchtime on 30th June. It was organised by a great team of staff members, Mx Skelton, Ms Cechova, and Mr Anderson, with the support of many others. The students' ideas and plans for this event were the most ambitious we have ever seen.

Preparations for the march included daily arts & crafts workshops where students made placards and decorations to wear during the parade. The respect and tolerance I have seen during the workshops are note-worthy. Students were helping each other express themselves fully and freely. Many students attended more than half of the workshop dates.

On the day, 55 students marched through the school following a pre-planned route. After the march, I asked students for comments, and this is what they said:

"Best time of my life." – Lucas E (10E)

"Probably the best moment in the whole school year. So proud of everyone who showed their true self." – James E (9S)

Following the march, all Key Stage 3 and 4 students attended a Character Development Session about the importance of Pride and community. They could ask questions and learn more about why Pride Month is important and how much it relates to all our school values, especially regarding community building.

Staff Leading by Example

Many teachers and support staff from all over the school came to the march to support our students. English teacher, Miss Osmani said: "I am so proud to see so many of our students living their best lives with pride."



On 16th June, LGBTQIA+ students and allies participated in a creative writing workshop run by our Head of English, Miss Windridge. The prompt was to write a poem starting each line with "I am..." or "I am not". In a supportive atmosphere, students could express their identity and share their poems with friends.

Our library is very supportive of our LGBTQIA+ community, and Mrs Sullivan, our librarian, is a great ally, providing a variety of books on LGBTQIA+ topics and fiction featuring LGBTQIA+ characters. This month, we decided to expand our collection even more, and we are taking suggestions from students and staff for new books. These new books will contain a special plaque commemorating Pride Month 2022 in our school.

Closing Words and Looking to the Future

Mx Skelton, who has organised and supported our students every step of the way, said: "Looking back at our students, I could not have been more proud. Well done, Northampton Academy!"

I am also incredibly proud of what we have done this June, and I hope we will have the opportunity to do similar events in the future. We work tirelessly in the library and in the LGBTQIA+ club to plan with intersectionality in mind, leaving no one behind.

Sensory Garden Working Bee!

Northampton Academy would like to thank everyone who contributed to our Sensory Garden project and those who took part in our 'Working Bee' on Saturday, 21st May.

English teacher Lisa Ullmann, who led the project, gives some background on how it all started:

"In September 2022, during a Teacher Training Day, preparing to start a new academic year, I heard our Director of Character and Director of Business talking about creating a garden, so I asked if I could be involved."

"A rough design idea was drawn up, and I offered to take them to a local garden (Quinton Rectory Garden) to show them what we might aim for on a smaller scale. After the visit, we agreed that we needed a professional garden designer as we wanted to get it right. Unfortunately, this worked out to be too expensive so the next thing I knew, I had agreed to design the garden myself."

"I have always believed that a walk through a beautiful garden is likely to help most people feel more relaxed, and the smells, sounds and colours of the planting will help to influence this. There is growing evidence that the benefits of sensory gardens can be considerable to mental and physical health and wellbeing. The NHS has, since January 2019, officially included social prescribing in its Long Term Plan. Sitting in a garden is crucial for some people as they engage mostly at a sensory level when cognition is compromised. For others, the emotional response to gardens makes a difference to health and wellbeing, helping us feel calmer and happier. This is what I set out to achieve with our school garden. I worked on the design in my spare time in the evenings and at weekends."

"I knew that I wanted it to be a community project, so I reached out to Workbridge, established 41 years ago in Northampton. Workbridge offers a vocational pathway for people with mental illness, autism, learning disabilities or brain injuries and provides people with opportunities to gain skills and build confidence. I visited the Lead at Workbridge, Helen Bass, several times as

I wanted to support this wonderful charity by purchasing all our plants through them. I also reached out to Verity Williams from Travis Perkins, who not only agreed to donate 5 tonnes of chip bark but turned up on the day of our first ever community Working Bee with two colleagues who worked tirelessly to put plants in the ground for us."

"On the day of the Working Bee, staff, parents and students from all key stages turned up and worked diligently to create our sensory garden. We even had members of the wider community come along to help those whose children do not attend our school, but had heard we needed a hand to get some 800 plants in the ground. It was a real team effort to complete this project, and it was fantastic to see so many people join together to make this possible. All there is left to do now is for staff and students to enjoy the space".

Ashiki and Cameron contacted their old primary school, Ecton Brook, and asked if they could deliver a session on Digital Footprints and creating social media accounts to the

Sports Leaders Leadership Academy

During February half term at Northampton Academy we were delighted to welcome the Sports Leaders from the County Leadership Academy to attend our first face-to-face session of the academic year. It was great to issue all the leaders from across ten schools with their LCV Leadership Academy Hoodies, which were worn with pride by all.

The day incorporated the following elements:

Team Building

Given that this was the first time we had gathered this year's cohort of leaders, the students needed to get to know each other. So we took them out of their school group comfort zone through some fun activities. Mrs Carter-Morris led two great activities: Winter Luge and Spaghetti/Marshmallow tower building, to encourage the students to work together.



Cricket Practical

Northants County Cricket Club provided two coaches who delivered a session focussing on cricket skill games practice. The Year One Leaders were then given a resource card and asked to set up and teach the cricket activity to the rest of the group. Year Two leaders were asked to set up a Dynamos Cricket game to mimic what they will be required to do at the County School Games Finals in July. All the leaders did really well.

When reviewing sessions, the STEP principle was used:

Space - Is the area appropriate for the activity?

Task - How can you change the activity?

Equipment - How can you adapt the equipment for the needs of the children?

People - How do you group children quickly? Where are they positioned?



Session planning and next steps

Following further team-building activities, including twoperson bobsleigh, the leaders reviewed and critiqued a series of anonymous session plans that the leaders had written and submitted. This exercise allowed the leaders to see how others had approached the task and the content they included, hopefully allowing them to consider what needs to be included in their future session plans. Leaders were then grouped by their schools, providing an opportunity to start their medium-term planning for their in-school projects. This time together was precious, allowing the leaders to discuss and finalise their plans before approaching their in-school mentor to confirm their start date, cohort, etc.



The final part of the session separately grouped the Year One Leaders and the Year Two Leaders. Year One Leaders met with Mrs Carter-Morris to discuss their roles and how they will use the Wonder Woman resources to deliver the Get Active Festival at the Summer School Games on Thursday 7th July 2022. Miss Lawrence met with the Year Two Leaders to discuss their roles before the County School Games Cricket Finals and their positions on the day. All leaders were advised that there will be an additional face-to-face session over the Easter holidays — this session will intend to provide some Cricket Officiating training and First Aid training. All Year One Leaders were given their County Leadership hoodies.


















'Ladies that Lunch' Computer Science Event

Student Reflections

Hi! I am Niki, part of the Nucleus STEM stream and I have enjoyed all the subjects I am studying. I have learnt Maths and Science in more detail, where my teachers have taught me content from GCSE or even A Level.

As part of STEM, we are encouraged to further develop skills such as leadership; therefore; students have decided to start their own clubs. One of these clubs is the Astronomy Club, which



I am a part of. We do amazing presentations and learn about astronomy, physics, and other subjects. We also have had the opportunity to attend various lectures throughout the year, such as game development, engineering, astronomy, and medicine. Besides the lectures, we are expected to attend a 6-week course after school linked to a specific STEM subject. There is a multitude of courses varying from designing robots and programming to investigative science and even dissections!

I was delighted when I was told we could also learn various musical instruments as part of the programme. So far, I have had piano and drums lessons each, focusing on learning songs for exams. Still, these lessons also help us improve in our music lessons which we have every two weeks.

We have been part of an international exchange with a school in Taiwan, where I had the opportunity to meet with students in another country. We shared conversations with the students in Taiwan about our school days. It was a unique opportunity for me. At the next meeting, we are planning to talk about our countries.

Coming to Northampton Academy has given me a unique experience of being part of the Nucleus STEM Stream. I look forward to seeing the new Year 7 students joining the STEM Stream in September. Niki 7S

Investigative Science

During Investigative Science, we have been examining various animal organs and understanding the different parts of these, as well as their functions in the organ systems. Our first session consisted of dissecting a pig's eye and exploring the various aspects of it, including the lens, ciliary muscles, optic nerve, and sclera. We then looked at the heart of a lamb and each of the four chambers whilst discussing the purpose for each one and why our heart is, arguably, the most crucial organ in our body. Additionally, we were able to observe the heartstrings and

some of the major veins and arteries that lead out from our heart, along with the difference between the two ventricles. Most recently, we have examined a pair of kidneys and their role



in removing toxins from the body. In this analysis, we looked at the distinct parts of the kidney, such as the capsule, medulla,



renal vein, artery, and the two types of blood vessels found there (cortical and interlobular). From the time spent in our extracurricular investigative science course, we have all

widened our understanding of biological make-ups and thoroughly enjoyed seeing these different organs up close. Aarya, 9S

Six-week Co-curricular Modules

As a part of the STEM program, there has been a recent addition of co-curricular six-week courses per half term to further our education in the STEM subjects and allow us to put our knowledge into practice. The current ones include investigative science, engineering, stop-motion animation, understanding genetic markers, and programming. Izzy and Matthew, 9S

Understanding Genetic Markers

In the first lesson of the understanding genetic markers six-week program, we started to learn about DNA (or deoxyribonucleic acid). DNA is a molecule that carries genetic information; four bases have the information: a, g, c, and t. We also learnt about DNA's double helix structure. Also, a couple of sessions later, we started a practical where we had DNA and then five other pieces of DNA. The DNA was placed in wells in some gel and separated using electrophoresis (the pieces are separated using electricity). The DNA is then stained with a dye that attaches to specific sequences of bases; then, we could see which of the five pieces matches the first piece of DNA. This is DNA profiling. We learnt that identical twins have the same profile and that more evidence is needed when convicting for a crime as DNA profiles are not enough. I enjoyed doing this as it was fascinating to learn about how DNA works, and the practical was helpful in understanding it better. Lola, 8S

Stop-motion Animation

The Nucleus STEM co-curricular has been excellent so far. Although we've only experienced some of the many activities this year due to Covid-19, they have been very interesting.

Brilliant Club

A recent addition to STEM has been the Brilliant Club, in which a cohort of Year 9 had the opportunity to learn about the history of the Windrush generation and the factors involving the recent Windrush Scandal in 2018. These are complex topics requiring the analysis of different laws and acts passed to comprehend the history of this generation fully. Nucleus STEM

Lego League Robotics Competition

This year, the theme of the annual First Lego League competition was cargo connect. In the Nucleus STEM Stream at Northampton Academy, we were lucky enough to attend this event.

Our team of eight displayed our school's core value of determination to overcome challenges using our problem-solving skills.

There were many different elements to this project: the three vital components were the robot, the code, and the innovation project. Our challenge was for our robot to deliver cargo to different forms of transportation or target locations around our given field. In the current day and age, everyone depends on transporting goods for their daily needs. As more demands are placed on the transportation systems, we will face challenges unless we find new ways or improve existing methods. This is what inspired our design and innovation project.



Our plans underwent many different prototypes, with the design constantly having to be adjusted, reworked, and changed when new complications arose. With that, the code had to consistently be changed as it depended on the foundation of the robot. For example, the robot started with two wheels and two arms. Then it changed to four wheels, and we completely forgot it needed an arm! So our plan constantly changed until we all agreed that the final design was the best possible outcome it could be.

During this time, two team members worked on our innovation project, which was entirely based abound sustainability and green transportation. First, we created a short 5-10 minute presentation based on our 'Project Spark'. We also had to develop or improve a piece of equipment, a technology, or a method of transportation to solve your specific problem. Finally, we decided to blueprint how our sustainable vehicle would look. The lead-up to our project was trial and error, research, and repetitive testing. Some aspects were quite tedious, but every single element ensured that what we brought to the competition was the best version we had. Also accompanied by the most developed code and a well-researched and presented innovation project.

However, this did not prepare us for the unexpected obstacles we faced on the day. Upon arrival at the Institution of Engineering and Technology in Coventry, many challenges arose, and we had to think quickly about how to solve them. One of these obstacles was that our robot had died, and when we changed the batteries, all of the code was wiped entirely from it, meaning that we had to recode and reupload all of it. We also found out that all of the other teams had been preparing for an extra month and a half compared to us and had a much more advanced level of code and robot structure. Despite the unforeseen complications, we were determined to pull together as a team. We ensured that when it came to our robot game (the central part of the competition), we had a somewhat functional program and stood a chance of having a positive outcome.

At the same time, we also had to present our innovation project and answer questions surrounding our robot, the innovation project, and the process. We were questioned on how each team member contributed, the design process, how we worked as a team and how we displayed our school's core values throughout our preparation. The consistent display of our school's core values won us the overcoming adversity award in



this competition. Although we didn't win overall, our portrayal of Northampton Academy's principles was just as significant to the outcome. Even though the competition itself was extremely stressful, from this experience, we have all developed our resilience, determination, tolerance, and patience. Considering the difficulties we faced, we have all built up our character and have learnt what to expect next time to ensure we win first place.

Regardless of the challenges, both on the day and during the build-up, this fantastic experience gave us all so much value. Despite all the coding, robot building, and innovation project being done by the students, none of us would have been able to do it without the support of Mrs Staff and Mrs Ashton. Lego robotics

was an incredible experience with so many valuable lessons, and we cannot wait until next year's competition.

Elite Sports End of Term Report

Since October last year, we have been delighted with the continued individual development of our young 85 (football and netball) athletes across all seven squads.

We are equally excited by the growth of our new pathways for our aspiring pupils in Football (Aston Villa, Birmingham City, Derby County, Leicester City & Northampton Town) and Netball (Northants Storm). For example, after Easter - Kelly Washington, the Head Coach for Northants Storm, led the week's training for all year groups. This was a tremendous opportunity to showcase their ability and learn from another top-level coach.

On the court, all four of our Elite Netball teams have excelled in their league programme, with some outstanding individual and team performances. All four groups (Year 7 -10) finished in the top two of their leagues, with Year 8 crowned league champions. Other highlights have also been the Year 8 and Year 10 girls winning the County Plate events (at KBA) and advancing to the County Cup play-offs.



On the football pitch, our Year 8 and 9 teams have trained very well, and their desire to improve as individual players and people has been a joy to part of, as the fundamental skill of someone is to be an outstanding character. Meanwhile, the Year 7 squad reached the 5th Round of the National Cup, along with the County Cup final (after an incredible semi-final win at NSB). Furthermore, they rounded off the season in style by winning the County League, having won all their games.



Notably, the coaches who work with our athletes at Northampton Academy and in their respective representative training squads/ matches have been delighted with their character, attitude and intensity.

After 30 weeks of training and competing in 52 matches, the Elite squads' athletes and coaches are now in the Programme's reviewing, recharging and planning phase. This is an integral part of any successful learning loop. A leading Sports Psychologist (Mairi Mulvenna from the University of Northampton) and two high-level national athletes visited. This was to help our students understand how to apply techniques learned to aid their development and, ultimately, their performance.

Plans are also afoot for the 2022-23 Elite Sport Programme, where we are working on some exciting initiatives. The 4-week assessment block across each of the age groups will kick off our Programme in September, and the 50 applications from the new year 7 cohort will be joined by our current athletes. The process is robust, and along with the students' technical, physical, social and tactical ability, selection for the Programme will be underpinned by mutually agreed criteria of attendance, behaviour and character.

Reading List Foundation Prize


A massive congratulations to Natasha in Year 13, who is the recipient of the Reading List Foundation Prize. This is given




Anaesthesiology Meeting
